Additionally, our Outreach team made a profound impact by meeting with numerous nurses and counselors within the Christina School district to educate them on the support available through NAWC. This concentrated effort resulted increasing our assistance to children and families in need by twofold.

Outreach Chair Katie Hughes and other NAWC volunteers visited several schools in the Christina School District to explain how NAWC could assist with the needs of their students and families. These meet and greets have been integral to our future success in showcasing our mission.



With the generous support of local organizations and individuals, more than 400 families were given the unique opportunity to shop the pop up food market and choose their own non-perishable foods in addition to accessories and personal care products during this years' Holiday Food Program.



Newark Charitable and Social Club raised \$3,000 for NAWC at their annual Fall Auction.



We provided \$46,500 in Emergency Assistance funding to 60 families in need.



The Food Cupboard distributed more than \$45,800 in food to 207 families.



We purchased 188 pairs of shoes, valued at \$8,000 for 166 children and 22 adults.



Special Projects including support to Meals on Wheels and The Newark Partnership.



More than \$1,000 was spent to fund care closets and purchase school supplies for several schools in the Christina School District and the Newark Senior Center.



Emergency Assistance Program



NAWC provides financial assistance to families and individuals in the Newark area who need immediate support. Referrals for this program are provided by our friends at the Hudson State Service Center, Newark Housing Authority, City of Newark and the Empowerment Center.

Our financial support provides neighbors in need with shelter and other critical needs, including utilities, rent, mortgage payment, prescription medicines, bedding and bus tickets.

In 2022, the Emergency Assistance Program:

Served 60 Families, comprising:


- 81 Children
- 78 Adults
- \$46,500 in Emergency Cash Funding
- Continued to streamline our vetting process and expand our outreach

Food Cupboard



NAWC maintains a well-stocked food cupboard, located at the Newark United Methodist Church, providing people in need with meals for a week.


In 2022, the Food Cupboard:

- Served 207 families, comprising:
 - 2416 children
 - 414 adults
- The value of food distributed was \$45,800 of which \$5,000 of food was purchased. The remainder were donations to the food cupboard.
- Demonstrated a strong volunteer force more than 20 people served families in need each month.

Holiday Food Box Program



On December 16 and 17, the Newark Area Welfare Committee along with the generosity of local individuals and organizations served many families.

A pop-up food market was erected at the Newark First Presbyterian Church where local community members were able to choose their own non-perishable foods as well as a selection of cold weather clothing accessories, personal care products and childrens' toys and books.

Families in need also received grocery store gift cards to be used for the purchase of perishable foods. Additionally, food, produce and gift cards were delivered to individuals and families that were unable to pick up.

Shoe Program



NAWC's Shoe Program purchases new shoes for children and adults in need in the Newark area.

The Program currently works with the Hudson Center, Newark Empowerment Center, Holy Angels and several schools within the Christina School District. The Shoe Program plans to expand to more schools and several other agencies in 2023.

In 2022, the Shoe Program:

- Purchased 188 pairs of shoes for
 - 166 children
 - 22 adults
- Program was fully funded by monetary donations including a grant from the Wilmington Flower Market.

Outreach Program



The NAWC Outreach committee was able to support several areas in our community this year. The main concentration was hosting Meet and Greets with the local schools to show how NAWC is able to support our families in need.

- Within Christina School District
 - Continued to support Care Closets at West Park Elementary and Gauger-Cobbs Middle School. In addition we supplied hygiene products to Gauger-Cobbs & Shue-Medill Middle Schools as well as Newark and Christiana High Schools.
 - Donated 10 backpacks with school supplies and 35 winter coats, mittens and hats to Downes Elementary School students.
 - Held Meet and Greets with 9 of the 22 schools
- Thanksgiving Meals Provided meals for 26 families from local elementary schools.
- Christmas Adopt-A-Family Provided holiday cheer to 8 families with \$5,000 of expenditures.
- Special Projects Provided emergency assistance consisting of clothing, furniture and necessities to 3 displaced families.
- NAWC Cookbook and Bean Sales Partnering with Rooted on Main, Herman's Quality Meat Shoppe, State Line Liquors, Andrew Gallagher Jewelers and Newark Senior Center, over 50 bags of bean soup mix and over 20 cookbooks were sold at these local establishments.











The generosity of our donors made it possible to fund \$34,500 of Special Projects in 2022.

City of Newark	\$20,000	Paid down in arrears utility bills for residents in the City.
Newark Senior Center Meals on Wheels	\$10,000	Provided meals to senior citizens, allowing them to "age in place" rather than moving to assisted living facilities.
Empowerment Center	\$2,500	Provided sleeping bags, "to-go" bags, personal care items, and lunch each month for the clients of the Empowerment Center.
The Newark Partnership	\$1,000	Provided funding for back to school supplies.
Newark Senior Center	\$1,000	Helped fill care closets with personal care items for the senior center clients
